Who knows what really got into Ron's parents when they decided to 'let loose' one of the deadliest drummers in North America. All I know is. I'm sure glad he's on our side. Why is it though that Ron's father was an accomplished baritone player with the famed Second Signal Regiment Band then later became a member of the Marching Ambassadors corps and Ron still wanted to be a drummer ...

The year 1960 saw Ron as a member of the Optimists Bantam Corps (a forerunner of the present Cadets) In those early days Ron spent much of his time (8 months) practicing with sticks to Frank Arsenault records and those of Glen Miller. He was with the Bantams all of two months before moving up to the Jr. Corps in September of 1960. During 1961 he was a "spare" and also that was the year he somehow escaped initiations...but don't let THAT give you

guys any ideas. During the 1981 season Romm (Skip) Prokop was on smare along with Vic Kruklis and Brian Williams..."Burack, Hedworth, and Bignell" were tenore, Glen (Stinky) Copp was on cymbals and Dave Johns and Frank Rood held down the Bass Drum section. (YES, that was John Rood's brother...but thats another story)

Finally in 1962 Ron made the snare line dramming with Vic Kruklis and Ronn Prokop. This was a memorable year because it was also Drum Major Jim McConkey's first year with the corps. Ronn Prokop, on leaving the corps stayed in Show Business and went full time. He is at present the drammer for the exciting group "Lighthouse".

Ron played smare with the corps for 5 years, 1962, 1963, 1964, 1965 and 1966 and in 1966 at Nationals at Expo Stadium in Montreal, he was the guy that dropped his stick and PICKED IT UP...one full point!

WELCOME GIRLS!

A TRADITION IS BROKEN...Drum Corps fans will notice a profound change in the Optimists this year, for during the past month of April a monumental decision had to be made. Bowing to the yearly extreme pressures of lax membership in the guard section of the corps, the executive was forced to break an age-old tradition which has been part of the Optimists since they were first founded...an all-male colour guard. Acting on the capable advice of Mr. Bugh Mahon of Garfield, N.J. (who is responsible for the corps drill this year) the executive arranged to have girls in the guard.



Mr. Mahon explained to the male faction of the corps at a rehearsal of April 8th, the necessity of an adequate number of secondary flags for this year's field show and also discussed briefly some of the advantages of a girls guard as experienced in his Garfield Cadet corps. After Mr. Mahon's talk, the hand-writing was on the wall, and the next rehearsal, April 11th. eight girls signed up to join the corps.

If my figures are right, this now leaves DeLaSalle Oaklands, the Madison Scouts and the Cavaliers of Chicago as the only major junior corps on the continent with all-boy corps.

Since April 11th more girls joined the guard while the boys who were in the guard, some have moved into the enlarged rifle line while another group enlarged the National squad. Others have joined the bugle and drum sections.

On behalf of the male section of the corps, I take this oppoputumity in GCC to welcome the girls into the corps as the Optimists begin a new tradition in their short but very successful history in the world of drum corps.

THE 1972 DRUM LINE:

I was informed by Mr. Daber, that this issue=of GCC is dedicated to the drummers of all three corps (its a tradition) so, here's a report on the Lancers line for '72.((What can I say about a section that has the misfortune to have the "Phantom Drummer" as a marching member...)

This years drum line is indeed superior to last years, especially so in the snare section. Perhaps the major weakness in the complete setion this year is our back up tenors. At the moment they lack self-discipline and this could cause trouble.

SNARES: Due to the fact that each member of the snare line has at least two years marching and playing experience, this section should really shine again this year. Reliable sources state that each member of this section are excellent drummers and should go far in drum corps. I guess the only bad thing about the snares is that they are inclined to "goof-off" (like our second story man, Doug Holmstead, who really likes fresh air at Dixon Grove.) For the snare to become utterly fantastic they must apply themselves more when practicing, for the better this section gets, the better year the entire corps will have.

TENORS: Unfortunately this section lost two or three of last year's old guys which sort of crippled us. Our new tenors are rather good except they lack self-discipline when on-the-line. This has got to stop before May arrives. In order for this section to surpass the schievements of last year's lime, they'll have to work extremely hard on their self-discipline. We know you guys can do it!

BACK UP TENORS: This is the section that could be the biggest problem for the total line as they are very inexperienced and as yet are not that good at marching (but I'm sure Russ Blandford will smarten them up!) But, on the bright side, they could develop into good drummers but they need a lot more self discipline and self-respect for the Lancer Corps. I believe that is this section really works they can become really good and help the corps tremendously! Start practicing!

BASS DRUMS & CYMBALS: Again, this section is better than last years because its members are marching veterans and they are probably the best behaved in the drum line. In my opinion they are heading for a "super-summer" and they should help the corps tremendously.

DOUBLE BASS AND TYMBALIS: This section is perhaps the most flashy part of the drum line as all three members are excellent drummers and are not too bad at marching. However, this section is rather infamous because of one of its members, and I don't mean Linda or Cary...naturally I'm talking about that wrestling fan drummer, Mark Blandford. This guy shows almost no self-discipline at practice, ant altho you can't help liking him there are times you would really like to strangle him?...when he fools around at the wrong times. I think Mark could win the '72 "Drummeer of the Year" if he settles down...what about it Mark?

OPINION TIME: by David Burgess. = THE ROOKIE BUGLERS or "TROUBLE, TROUBLE,"=

I have observed many of the rookies when practicing and discover they have a tendency to waste valuable time...for exeample, when one makes a mistake he brings down his horn, rolls his eyes, huffs and puffs, etc.

When you make a mistake, just grin and try harder. That is how you learn and get better. Yes, the idea of the corps is to have fun but the harder you try and learn something the better you become and eventually the more enjoyment you get out of it ..RRAL FUN!

So, rookies, practice seriously and use the time wisely. Youll get better and so will the corps as a group as we prepare to "go west".

My personal thanks for allowing me to write this article, and Dave, may you stay with the corps for years to come!


LANCER LETTER:
